In 2010, the Georgia General Assembly passed the Water Stewardship Act, a landmark piece of legislation designed to promote water conservation and sustainable usage across the state. The law encourages residents and businesses to be more efficient in how they use water, especially during drought or low rainfall.

What you can do to help conserve water this summer:


- **Water Wisely** – Only water lawns and gardens in the early morning or late evening. Use a timer to avoid overwatering.
- **Fix Leaks Promptly** – A dripping faucet or leaking hose can waste hundreds of gallons of water each month.
- **Use Mulch in Your Garden** – Mulch helps retain moisture in the soil, reducing the need for frequent watering.

Small steps can make a big difference. By following the guidelines of the Water Stewardship Act and practicing everyday conservation, we can all help ensure that Georgia has a reliable water supply now and in the future. Seal the Savings: The Benefits of Caulking Your Windows and Doors

As temperatures rise during warmer months, keeping your home cool becomes a top priority—and so does keeping your energy bill in check. One simple, low-cost solution that can make a big difference is caulking your windows and doors.

Why Caulking Matters – Over time, small cracks and gaps can form around windows and doors. These openings may seem minor, but they allow cool, conditioned air to escape and let hot, humid air in. This means your air conditioner has to work harder, and you may have a higher utility bill. Caulking seals these gaps, improving your home's insulation and energy efficiency.

How to Caulk – Use exterior-grade caulk for outside work and paintable interior caulk for inside seams. Focus on the trim around windows and doors, where gaps are most common. Caulking may seem like a small home maintenance task, but the comfort and cost benefits add up quickly—especially during Georgia's long, hot summers.
