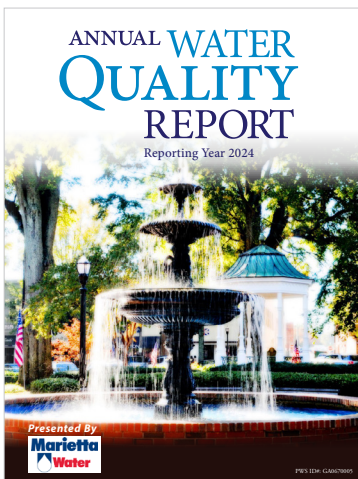

2024 Water Quality Report Now Available



Marietta Power and Water's new Water Quality Report is now available on our website and contains details of the drinking water testing that was performed between January 1 and December 31, 2024. Our drinking water is continually monitored for quality control and assurance, both at the treatment plant and in the distribution system. Thousands of water samples are collected and tested each year to monitor for a variety of organic and inorganic substances. As outlined in this water quality report, your water meets or exceeds all state and federal drinking water standards. Our staff works around the clock to ensure you have reliable water service and high-quality drinking water.

This annual report meets the federal Safe Drinking Water Act (SDWA) requirements for the Consumer Confidence Report (CCR). It contains information on the source of our water, its constituents, and the health risks associated with any contaminants.

Recommended Items to Include in a Basic Ready Kit:

Water: At least 3 gallons per person, for drinking and hygiene
Food: At least a 3-day supply of non-perishable food
Can opener: For food, if kit contains canned food
Radio: Battery-powered or hand crank NOAA Weather Radio with tone alert and extra batteries
Emergency charger: for mobile devices
Flashlight and extra batteries
First aid kit
Whistle: To signal for help
Face mask: To help filter contaminated air and plastic sheeting and duct tape to shelter in place
Moist towelettes, garbage bags and plastic ties: For personal hygiene
Wrench or pliers: To turn off utilities
Local maps

Additional Items to Consider Adding to a Ready Kit:

Prescription medications and glasses
Infant formula and diapers
Pet food and extra water: For your pet
Important family documents: Such as copies of insurance policies, identification and bank account records in a waterproof, portable container
Cash or traveler's checks and change
Emergency reference material: Such as a first aid book or information from Ready.gov
Sleeping bag or warm blanket: For each person. Consider adding bedding if you live in a cold-weather climate
Complete change of clothing: Include a long-sleeved shirt, long pants and sturdy shoes. Consider adding clothing if you live in a cold-weather climate
Household chlorine bleach and medicine dropper
Fire extinguisher
Matches: in a waterproof container
Personal hygiene and personal hygiene items
Mess kits, paper cups, plates, plastic utensils, paper towels
Paper and pencil
Books, games, puzzles or other activities for children
