A Year in Review

2018 was a landmark year for Marietta Fire Department.

After forty years of service, Marietta Fire Department saw a change in leadership as a result of the retirement of Chief Jackie Gibbs, and after twenty years of dedicated service, Marietta Fire Marshal Tim Milligan was appointed to the Fire Chief's position. While the landscape of the department changed, so has the landscape of the City. The new emergency department for Kennestone Hospital, Atlanta United Complex, upgrades to Marietta Square and numerous large scale redevelopment projects dot the horizon of our city.

Marietta Fire Department is committed to serving all the existing and new facilities within our jurisdiction with the best possible service. As detailed in the statistical summary, Marietta Fire Department responded to 12,855 calls for service and is counted on every day to provide the highest standard of care when an emergency arises. The call to *serve* is the mindset of Marietta firefighters.

The Training Division provided the citizens of Marietta with twelve recruits to add to the ranks of Marietta Fire Department. After twelve weeks of intensive training in fire suppression and another twelve weeks of nationally recognized emergency medical training, the recruits will be prepared for a rewarding career helping others. Additionally, the Training Division prepared and documented the training for all Marietta firefighting personnel.
