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LETTER FROM THE CHIEF

2024 was a year of metamorphosis for the Marietta Police Department. The department started the year out with 29 sworn vacancies. Through a great deal of innovation, hard work and determination, the department ended 2024 at full staff within the sworn ranks. Many civilian police employees were hired in 2024 as well. That excellent outcome brought forward a greater challenge – assimilating those new hires into the department's culture and ensuring they were properly trained. The officers and staff of the department met the challenge, and we are on our way to fully achieving that task.

While working diligently to fill vacancies and train new officers and staff, the department also had a number of defined goals in 2024 which were achieved. Those goals included:

- Enhance Internal Procedures
- Prevent and Reduce Crime
- Expand Evidence-based Policing Initiatives in the Uniform Patrol Division
- Enhance Employee Development
- Enhance and Emphasize Recruitment

Many of the department's officers and staff also realized personal goals in 2024. In addition to numerous promotions throughout the year, eight achieved a college degree and three achieved senior police officer status.

With the personnel allocation changes brought forth by 2024, the department took the opportunity to restructure. The department brought back three true divisions by creating a third deputy chief position and placing a different deputy chief in command of each of the department's three divisions. In order to emphasize training and support of our influx of new officers, Uniform Patrol was restructured to form it primarily into the three uniform shifts, the Public Safety Ambassador program and the Prisoner Transport program. Most of the department's specialized units were relocated to the Investigative Services Division to allow resources to be combined to target problems within the city as they developed. In addition, the department created a Wellness Officer position to support our personnel. The position was the first of its kind in Cobb County.

Despite the challenges faced by the department, 2024 we once again saw a decrease in crime for the City of Marietta. Crimes against property saw a very significant decrease of 23% while crimes against persons dropped 1%.

As 2025 begins, we look forward to the challenges to come, and we are ready to face them head-on with enthusiasm, positivity and the will to conquer any issues that come our way.

M-STAR

(MARIETTA STRATEGICALLY TARGETING AREAS WITH RESOURCES)

BACKGROUND

The M-STAR program was developed in 2000. The Marietta Police Department realized that more needed to be done to create a greater problem-solving partnership between the community and the police department. M-STAR is a way of policing that involves citizens, police officers, business owners, real time crime analysis, deploying manpower and follow-up. The initiative was originally planned to be a police department program but developed into a citywide philosophy. The purpose of M-STAR is to identify needs, issues, and concerns within the community and develop plans of action to address them.



ACCOUNTABILITY

The majors are responsible for the mitigation of quality-of-life issues and illegal activity within their assigned zones. Crime statistics are analyzed monthly to identify crime spikes and problem areas. Town Hall meetings are held regularly in each zone, and all residents and business owners are invited to attend and to actively participate. These meetings are designed to distribute information and provide community members the opportunity to voice any needs, issues or concerns they have, as well as helping to develop solutions for them. The majors then develop plans to address identified problems. Once a month, the majors meet with Chief Beam and the deputy chiefs to review crime statistics, and the progress made on previously voiced concerns. The majors must be able to demonstrate how they are actively working on solutions to crime spikes and how they are resolving the action forms they have received since the previous meeting.

M-STAR

(MARIETTA STRATEGICALLY TARGETING AREAS WITH RESOURCES)

COMMUNITY CONCERNS

Citizens may submit needs, issues, and concerns, directly to the department via mail, phone, email, or the online Citizen Request program. The Zone Major is responsible for responding to the citizen and overseeing the plan to address the situation. The majors track the progress of the actions being taken and maintain communication with the citizen for as long as needed.



BENEFITS

The M-STAR program has proven to be an effective tool in building relationships between neighbors, businesses, and police officers. Police officers get to know citizens, and citizens get to know officers. The increased interaction builds trust and encourages two-way communication. In the coming years, we will be able to utilize the crime statistics, which are being gathered now, to forecast crime. The goal is to forecast potential crime activity and deploy manpower and resources to reduce the opportunity for criminal activity and remove it from the city,

MPD COMMUNITY OUTREACH PROGRAMS



In accordance with the Community Policing Philosophy, the Marietta Police Department (MPD) acknowledges the importance of maintaining a positive relationship and ongoing dialogue with the community we proudly serve. The department has developed, maintained, and participated in advanced police-community relations and outreach programs designed to build bridges with the diverse citizens, businesses, and visitors of Marietta.



Citizens Police Academy

Citizen's Police Academy (CPA) - The CPA is open to all Marietta residents and business owners, and it is typically conducted twice a year in eleven-week sessions. Sessions are in the spring and fall; each has approximately 20 participants; and each session has classes one evening per week, each lasting three hours. Participants meet at police headquarters where MPD officers present classes on police topics such as major investigations, patrol techniques, traffic enforcement, and police training.



Pastors Police Academy

Pastor's Police Academy (PPA) - The PPA group meets one night a week for five weeks with each meeting lasting approximately two hours. The meeting format is oriented toward open dialogue between police and faith-based organizations. This program is offered periodically throughout the year.

School Resource Officers

School Resource Officers (SROs) - Working in collaboration with the Marietta School System, two police officers are assigned to the Marietta Elementary Schools, two police officers are assigned to the Marietta Middle School, and two police officers and one sergeant are assigned to the Marietta High School. The SROs build relationships with students in an educational setting for the purpose of mentoring youth to make sound decisions.



Cadet Program

Public Safety Cadet Program - The Public Safety Cadet Program is designed for young men and women between the ages of 14 and 21 who are interested in learning about careers in law enforcement. Cadets are trained by police officers on police procedures and law. They also assist the police department throughout the year with special events, such as crowd control and traffic direction.

Volunteers

Volunteer Program - MPD Volunteers provide support to all three divisions within the police department. Volunteers may assist with anything from clerical tasks with records to helping with cold case investigations. They assist the Training Unit, Detectives, and the Public Information Officer. MPD Volunteers also help the Community Response Unit during road races, special events on the square, and Cadet scenarios.

Internships

Police Internship Program - The MPD offers internships to college students interested in law enforcement careers. The goal is to provide hands-on educational experiences for students to gain valuable insight into career possibilities while pursuing academic goals. On average, students spend 150 hours with members of the police department during their internship.

Ride-Alongs

Ride-Along Program - Qualifying citizens can request to ride along with a uniform patrol officer for a four-hour period to observe officers performing their duties. The deputy chief of Uniform Patrol reviews all applications for approval or denial and coordinates with the shift commanders as to the placement of the ride-along participant.

Public Safety Equipment

For public information and safety concerns, CRU deploys message boards, speed trailers, and the SkyWatch tower, by request, throughout the community.



Tours

Upon request, tours of the police department are provided, mostly for school field trips and community groups.

CPTED

Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design (CPTED) - This is a multi-disciplinary approach to deterring criminal behavior through crime prevention techniques based on environmental design, such as lighting, landscaping, and locking devices. Trained and certified officers provide assessment and recommendation at the request of business owners, homeowners, and apartment complex owners/managers within Marietta.

In 2024, Marietta PAL hosted an After School Program and Summer Camp, on top of their additional sports and recreation programs.

PAL offered daily academics, health & fitness programs, sports & recreation, life skills, and more. Weekly facilitators visited to present yoga, dance, and theater classes.

Field trips included a Braves game, Elizabeth Porter Park, and Sparkles Skating.

YELLS

YELLS (Youth Empowerment through Learning, Leading, and Serving) - The YELLS Mentoring Program is a Marietta PAL sponsored youth leadership development community service program which matches twenty high school students with twenty elementary students. PAL supports this program by providing funding from National PAL Mentoring, transportation coordination and weekly food service for participating youth.

RAD Women

RAD Women (Rape, Aggression, Defense) - RAD Women is a 12-hour self-defense class for women only. The techniques are designed to be quick and effective in delivering pain to vulnerable locations on the attacker's body. The course is designed so that women of all fitness levels and ages will learn options to escape attacks. RAD is a twelve-hour course, delivered over 4 three-hour classes.

radKIDS

radKIDS (Resist, Aggression, Defense) - The national radKIDS safety education program was adopted by MPD in 2013. It is a five-week program that consists of meeting once a week for a two-hour session and it is designed to teach juveniles how to avoid aggressive/predator-type strangers. The police department has four certified RADKIDS instructors, which includes one MPD Detective. The program is offered by request, and requests have been received after actual MPD investigations into juvenile sexual assaults and abduction attempts of children.

CRU TRAINING AND SEMINARS

The Community Response Unit (CRU) conducts and coordinates crime and public safety presentations as requested by the Marietta community.



Community Safety Meetings

CRU frequently responds to requests from citizens, businesses, and schools to speak about trending crime related topics and provides information on crime prevention and how to most effectively partner with the police department.

CRASE

CRASE (Citizen Response to Active Shooter Event) Seminar - the department recognizes the impact of mass shootings on the community, and the fear citizens may have as a result of recent events. These seminars are held in an effort to inform the public on how to best evaluate their options and respond during an active shooter event.

Gun Safety Seminar

The Firearms Unit will host, upon request, a gun safety seminar. The seminar includes topics such as gun safety and gun laws. The seminar is usually a one-time two-hour session.



Stop the Bleed Training

Stop the Bleed is a national program designed to train citizens on how to assist the injured in the case of a serious medical incident until emergency responders arrive.

This training is presented by the Marietta Police Department in partnership with Wellstar Kennestone Trauma Services.

What You Do Matters

This is a combination of CRASE and Stop the Bleed.

COMMUNITY POLICING STRATEGY: PROCEDURAL JUSTICE

Procedural Justice is the framework of effective community policing strategies. It consists of four pillars: Fairness, Voice, Transparency, and Impartiality. When the four pillars are implemented, the result is an increase of respect and recognition of authority. This impacts how the police department is perceived by the community and the level of trust afforded to them.

SUPPORT SERVICES



The Support Services Division is comprised of many different units. They are the Training Unit, Records, Court Services, Accreditation, Property & Evidence, Payroll, Permits & IDs, and Research and Planning. The Public Information Officer is also within this division.



TRAINING UNIT

The Training Unit develops in-service and mandate style courses for both sworn and non-sworn personnel. The unit also assists with the review of current case law and use of force incidents in order to address any identified patterns through training. The Training Unit also provides an instructor at North Central Georgia Law Enforcement Academy for basic law enforcement courses.



The Records Unit

The Marietta Police Department provides an effective records management system to better serve the interests of the public and the efforts of the department. Individuals requesting copies of reports maintained by the Marietta Police Department shall be provided a copy of the incident or accident reports in accordance with Georgia law for a nominal fee.



Public Information Officer

There are three officers designated as Public Information Officers, with one serving as the primary point of contact for the police department. The Public Information Officer position is responsible for responding to requests from the media and communicating information to the public via social media. The Marietta Police Department is currently active on Facebook, Instagram, Twitter, Nextdoor, and LinkedIn, where daily posts are made with department updates and safety tips.

INVESTIGATIVE SERVICES

The Marietta Police Department's Investigative Services Division is a multifaceted entity, comprised of Detectives, Task Force Officers, STEP, CRU, CIU, and a Cyber Unit, responsible for in-depth investigations of a wide range of crimes, which occur in the City of Marietta. These investigations include Crimes Against Property and Persons, as well as a collaboration with multiple federal and local agencies such as FBI, DEA, USSS, and MCS.



Crimes Against Property

Crimes Against Property detectives investigate burglaries, motor vehicle theft, larceny, and pawn shop violations.

Crimes Against Persons

Crimes Against Persons detectives respond to all major crime scenes including homicides, robberies, sexual assaults, kidnappings, and officer involved shootings. Efforts are focused on interviewing all involved parties and quickly tracking down potential leads in cases.

Cyber Unit

The Cyber Unit assists with tracking crime statistics to prevent and suppress criminal activity. The unit also conducts threat analysis, proactive OSINT monitoring, and assists investigative personnel during the course of their investigations by researching and documenting intelligence findings.

CIU

The Crime Interdiction Unit (CIU) is responsible for handling street level narcotics, conducting surveillance and handling any assignment involving criminal interdiction as dictated by the needs of the department.



Multi-Jurisdictional Collaboration

ICAC - The Investigative Division works with Internet Crimes Against Children (ICAC) and FBI's Metro Atlanta Child Exploitation (MATCH) Taskforce, which addresses the problem of children being forced into prostitution in the Atlanta area.

The Marietta Police Department provides two officers to the DEA, one officer to the FBI Safe Streets Gang Taskforce, one officer to the Secret Service Cyber Fraud Taskforce, and two officers to MCS.

STEP

The Selective Traffic Enforcement Program (STEP) is responsible for the investigation of fatality, life threatening injury, and hit and run accidents. Officers assigned to this unit work various hours and days to respond to the specified needs of the community as well as traffic complaints not worked by the patrol shifts.

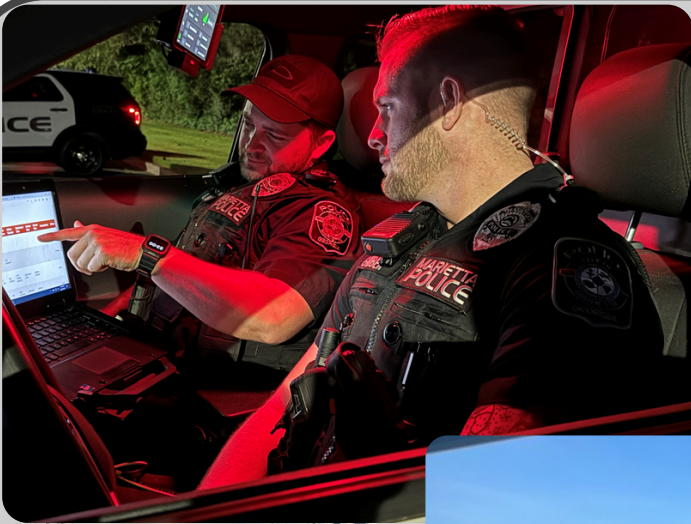


CRU

The Community Response Unit (CRU) is comprised of officers responsible for crime prevention programs, M-STAR Partnership, hosting and teaching citizen's academies, management of the volunteer and intern programs, tours and other non-traditional law enforcement events. School Resource Officers are assigned to this unit, each working with the City of Marietta School Board to assure safe schools and to help students succeed in a drug, crime, and gang free environment.

UNIFORM PATROL

Officers assigned to the Uniform Patrol Division are assigned to one of three shifts: Day Watch, Evening Watch, and Morning Watch. The Day Watch shift begins at 7 AM, Evening Watch at 3 PM, and the Morning Watch shift begins at 11 PM. Officers assigned to the three patrol shifts are responsible for responding to calls for service, accident investigations, zone patrols, and for complaint resolution.



K9

K9 Sparky is a 2-year-old Dutch Shepherd from Hungary and began his career with MPD in August of 2024. He is a dual-purpose canine trained in narcotics detection, criminal apprehension, tracking, building searches, and evidence recovery. K9 Sparky lives with his handler, Officer Bedford, who has served with MPD since 2013. When not at work, K9 Sparky enjoys tug-of-war and fetch.



K9 Fedor is a 3-year-old Dutch Shepherd from Hungary and began his career with MPD in March of 2023. He is a dual-purpose canine trained in narcotics detection, criminal apprehension, tracking, building searches, and evidence recovery. K9 Fedor lives with his handler, Officer Powell, who has served with MPD since 2009. When not at work, K9 Fedor enjoys hanging out in the yard with his family.

K9 Tyson is a 5-year-old German Shepherd/Belgian Malinois mix from Hungary and began his career with MPD in October of 2021. He is a dual-purpose canine trained in narcotics detection, criminal apprehension, tracking, building searches, and evidence recovery. K9 Tyson lives with his handler, Officer Foster, who has served with MPD since 2015. When not at work, K9 Tyson enjoys exercising with long walks.



PUBLIC SAFETY AMBASSADORS



Public Safety Ambassadors (PSAs) - The PSA program was implemented in 2017 and designed to enhance and support the day and evening watch uniform patrol shifts. The Marietta Police Department is allocated 13 PSAs and 1 PSA supervisor. The duties of the PSAs include traffic control, zone patrols of residential and commercial businesses, private property accident reports, responding to non-violent calls for service, and writing police incident reports. The PSAs also supplement staffing during large events such as parades, the July 4th events, and some road races.



H.O.P.E.

Homeless Outreach Program Endeavor (H.O.P.E.) - Renaming of the MPD Homeless Initiative. Creation of resource pamphlets that list local areas/facilities that can provide help/assistance. Developed/obtained signs that can be posted at camps, etc. for the notification of removal from a particular area. Usually deployed on larger camps, or when contact with all of the suspected inhabitants of the camp cannot be located for an official criminal trespass warning.

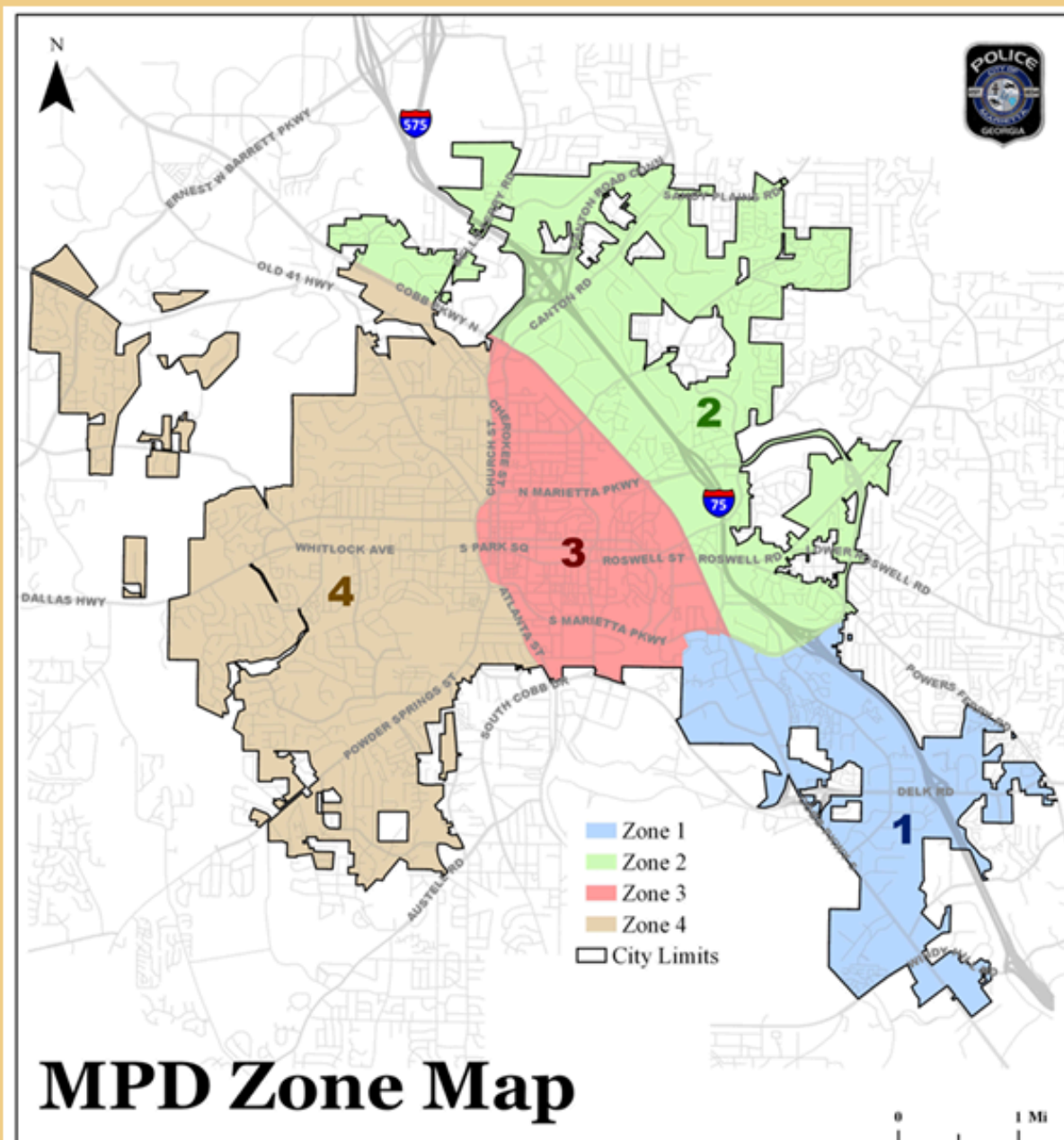


ASSIST

The Active Substance Support Intervention Solutions Team (ASSIST) was implemented in May of 2019. The team consists of trained officers who have volunteered to work with opioid addicts and Narcan-assisted overdose survivors. Two officers from the ASSIST team make non-judicial contact with all subjects revived by Narcan within 24 hours of the incident. Officers attempt to persuade the victims to voluntarily seek treatment and provide them with information on where they can receive help.

JURISDICTION

The Marietta Police Department's jurisdiction is divided into four zones, each commanded by a major. Each major is responsible for the management of police presence within the zone that they oversee while addressing quality of life issues and criminal activity. The following map shows the full Marietta Police Department jurisdiction by zone.



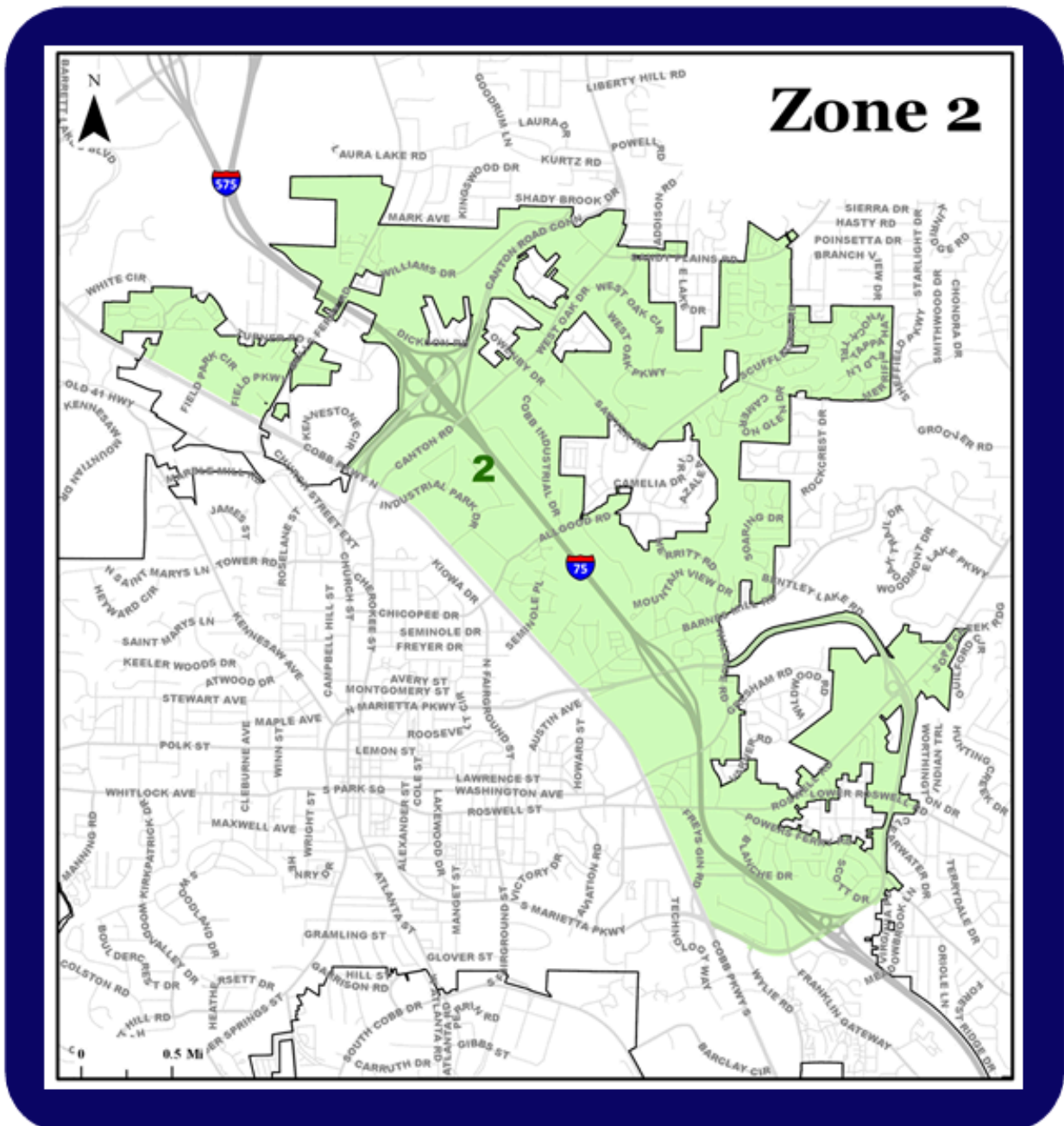

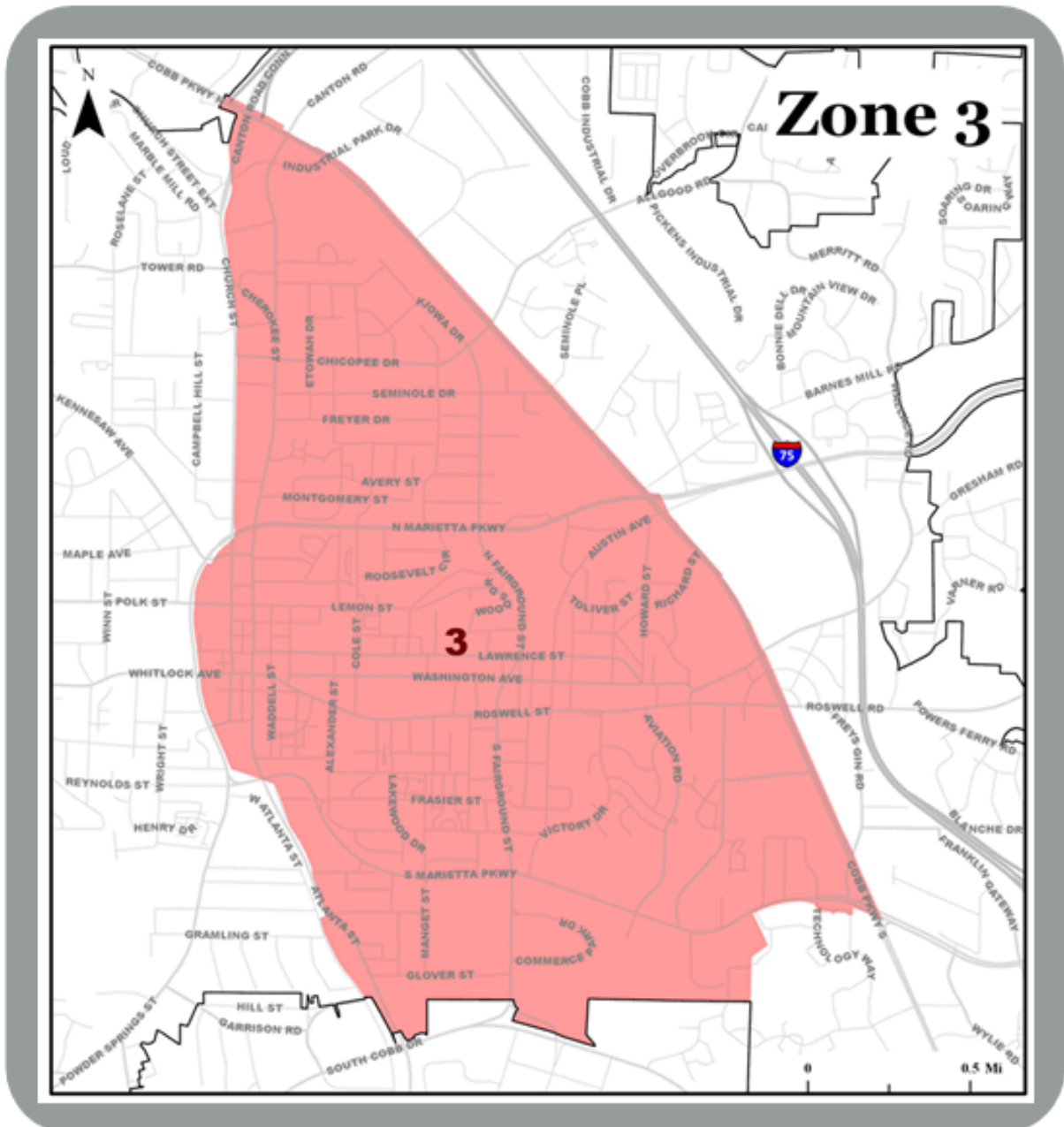
ZONE 2

- Zone 2 is commanded by Major Mixon.
- Zone 2 is located in the Northeastern part of the city. It encompasses everything in Marietta Police jurisdiction east of Cobb Parkway and north of South Marietta Parkway. I-75 runs through Zone 2 from South Marietta Parkway to the Northern city limits.
- Zone 2 has a diverse mix of businesses, industrial areas, and residential establishments. There are many single-family dwellings in this zone as well as apartment complexes.



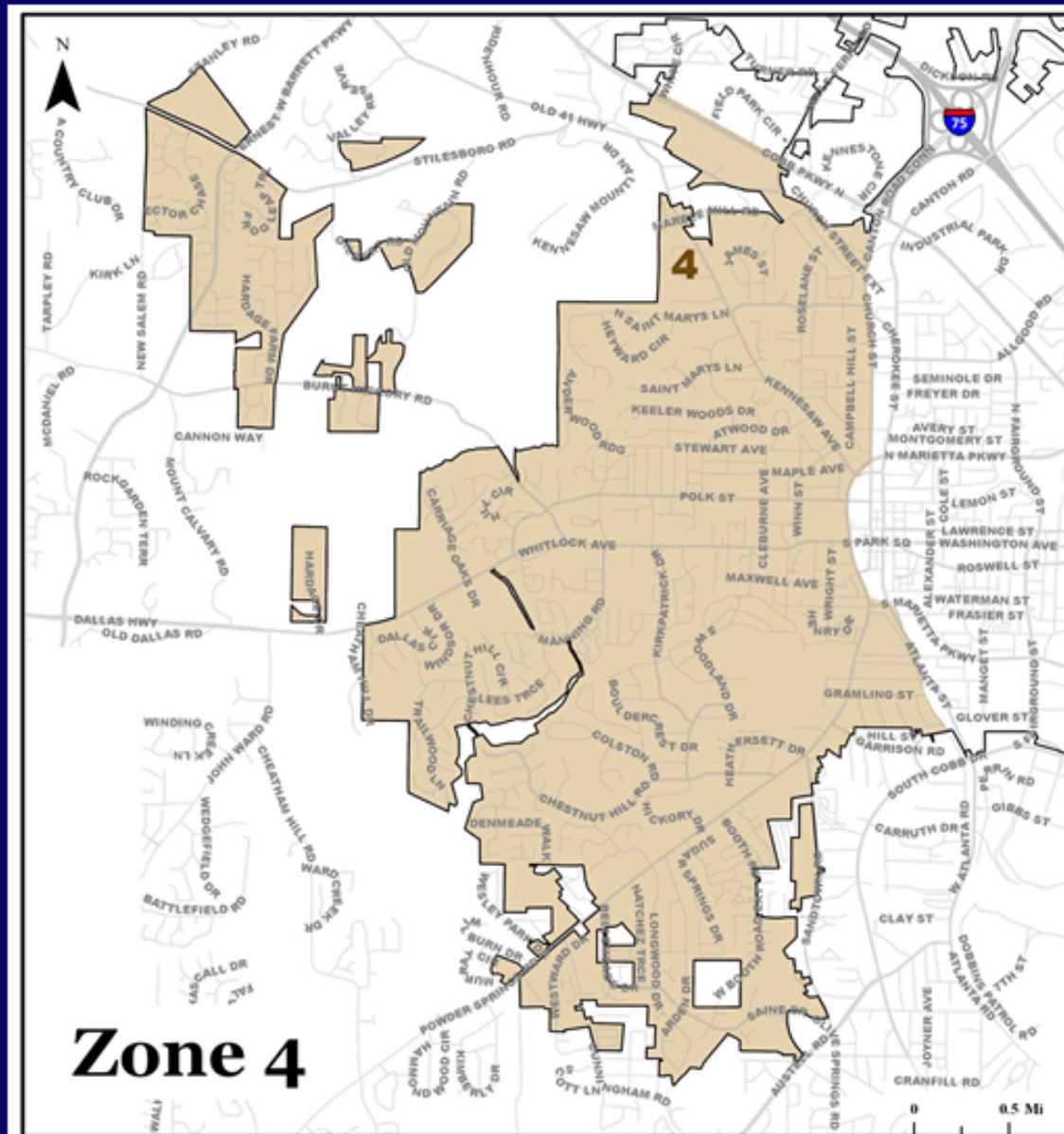
ZONE 3

- Zone 3 is commanded by Major Collins.
- Zone 3 is located at the heart of the city and is the only zone contiguous with all other zones. The Eastern boundary of Zone 3 is Cobb Parkway, and the Western border is North Marietta Parkway. The North end of Zone 3 comes together at the intersection of Cobb Parkway and the Church Street Extension. The Southern end of Zone 3 comes together between Atlanta Road and Cobb Parkway.
- The majority of Zone 3 is comprised of long-established single-family residential neighborhoods. Many of the houses located in Zone 3 were built in the 1940s when the Bell Bomber Plant was opened for World War II. A popular central business district area known as the Marietta Square is located in Zone 3.



ZONE 4

- Zone 4 is commanded by Major Marshall.
- Zone 4 is located in the historical southwestern part of the city. It encompasses all of the territory west of Church Street, west of the intersection 120 Loop at Whitlock Avenue, and extends South to encompass both sides of Powder Springs Road.
- Zone 4 is systematically in the blueprint stage of a revitalization effort in the Powder Springs Street corridor. The most notable landmark in Zone 4 is the Hilton Marietta Conference Center and Resort, which sits on the former site of the nineteenth-century Georgia Military Institute.

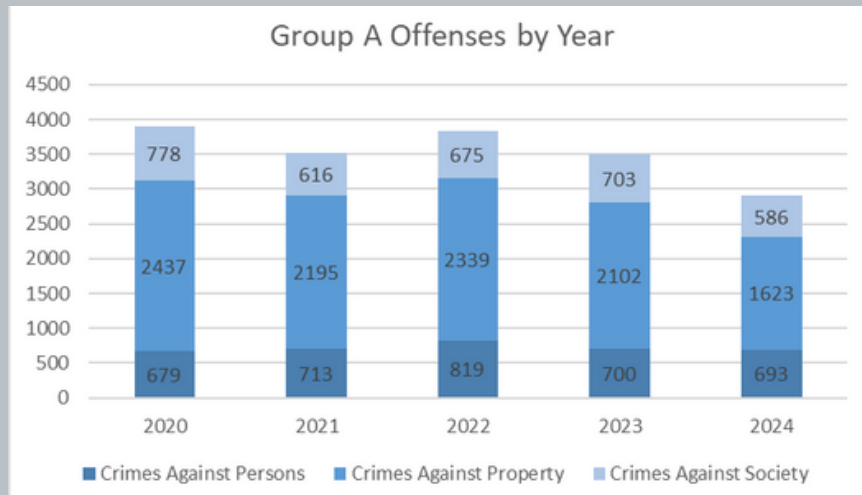


2024 CRIME DATA

The following crime data shows reported incidents categorized in accordance with a statistical data collection system administered by the U.S. Department of Justice called the National Incident-Based Reporting System (NIBRS). The data shown represents NIBRS Group A Offenses, which fall under the categories of Crimes Against Persons, Crimes Against Property, and Crimes Against Society.

In September 2019, the Marietta Police Department joined police departments across the nation in transitioning from the Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) to the now federally mandated NIBRS crime reporting system. NIBRS includes more crime categories and requires additional data elements than what were previously reported in years past with the UCR system.

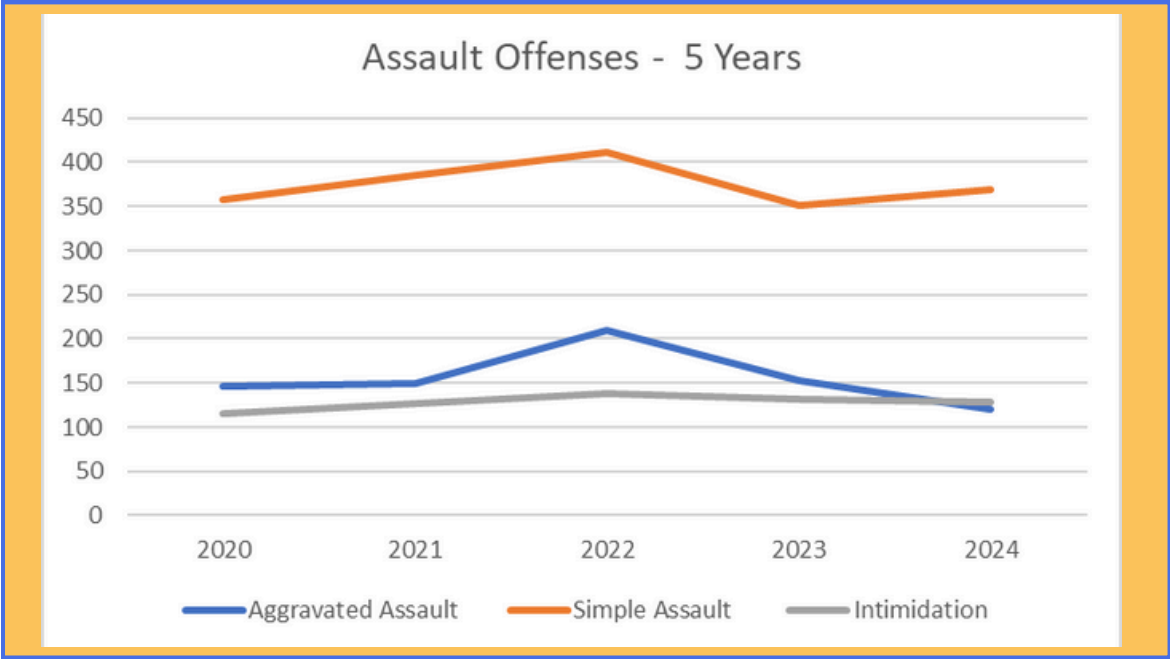

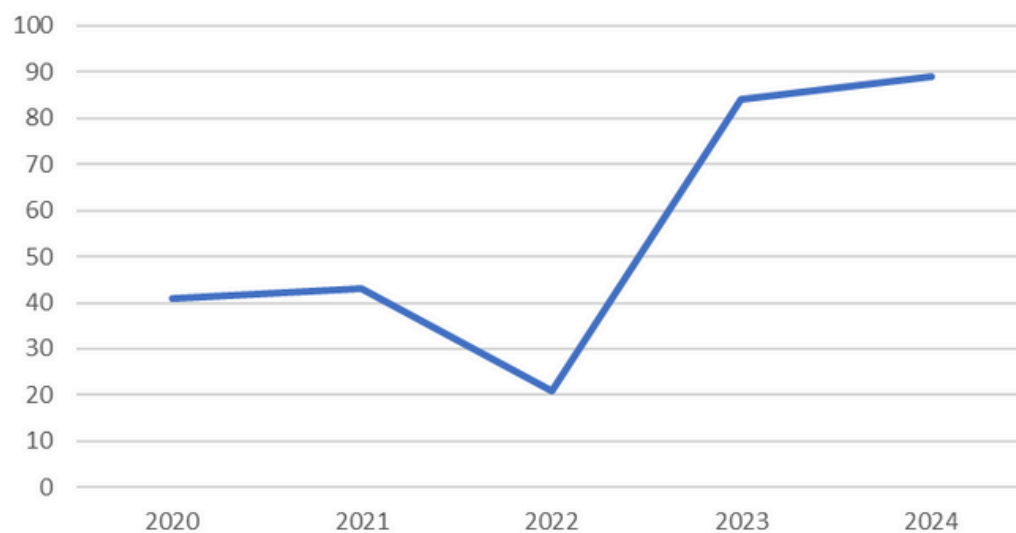
Drug/Narcotic Violations - 5 Years



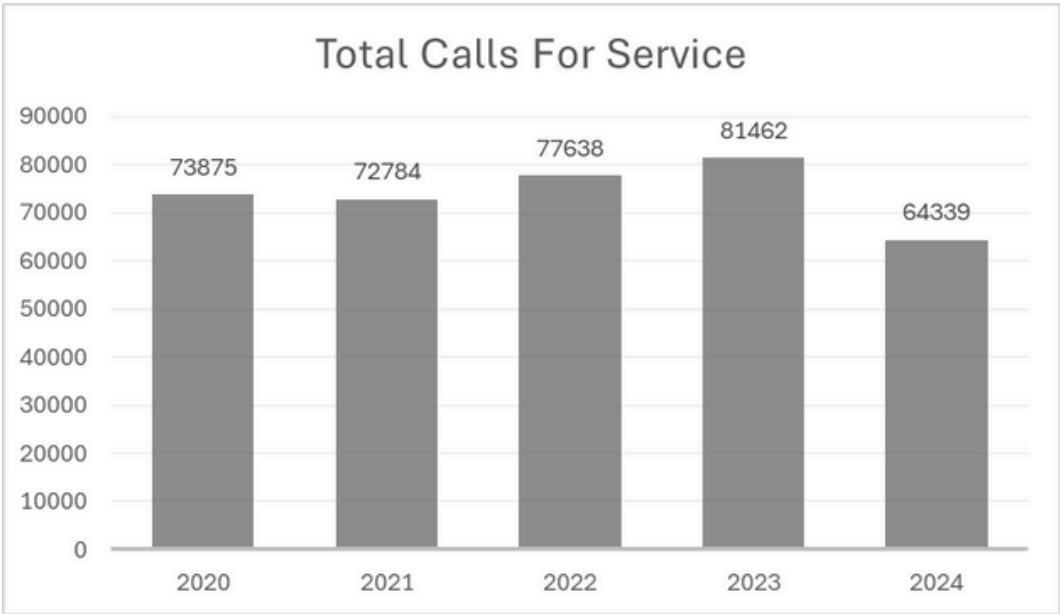
Prostitution Offenses - 5 Years



Weapon Law Violations - 5 Years



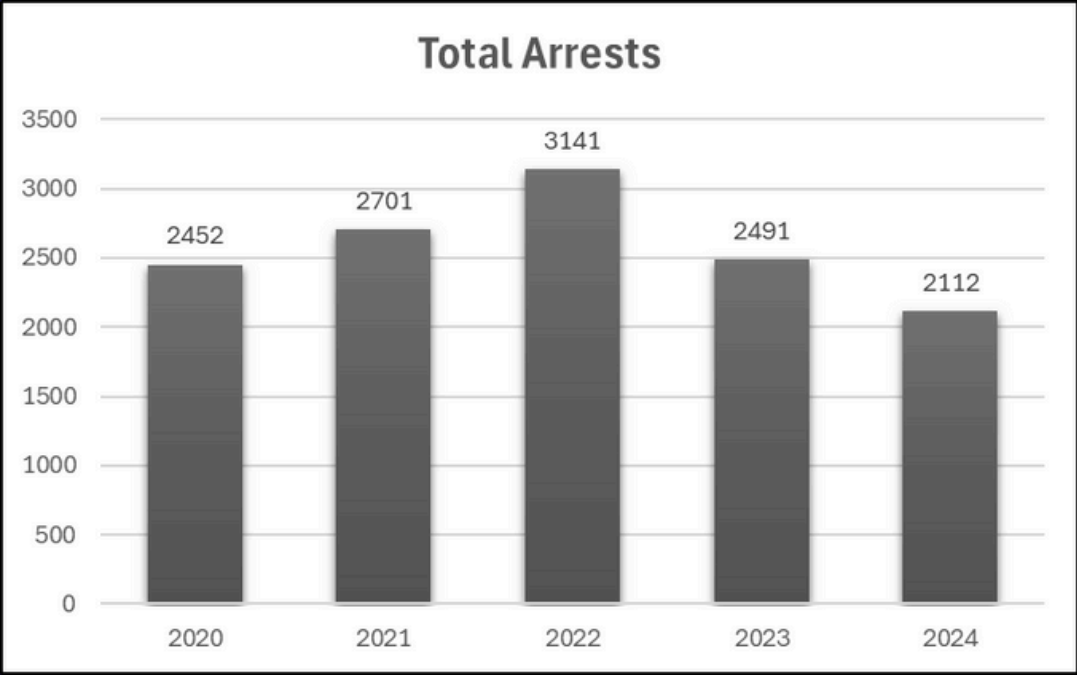

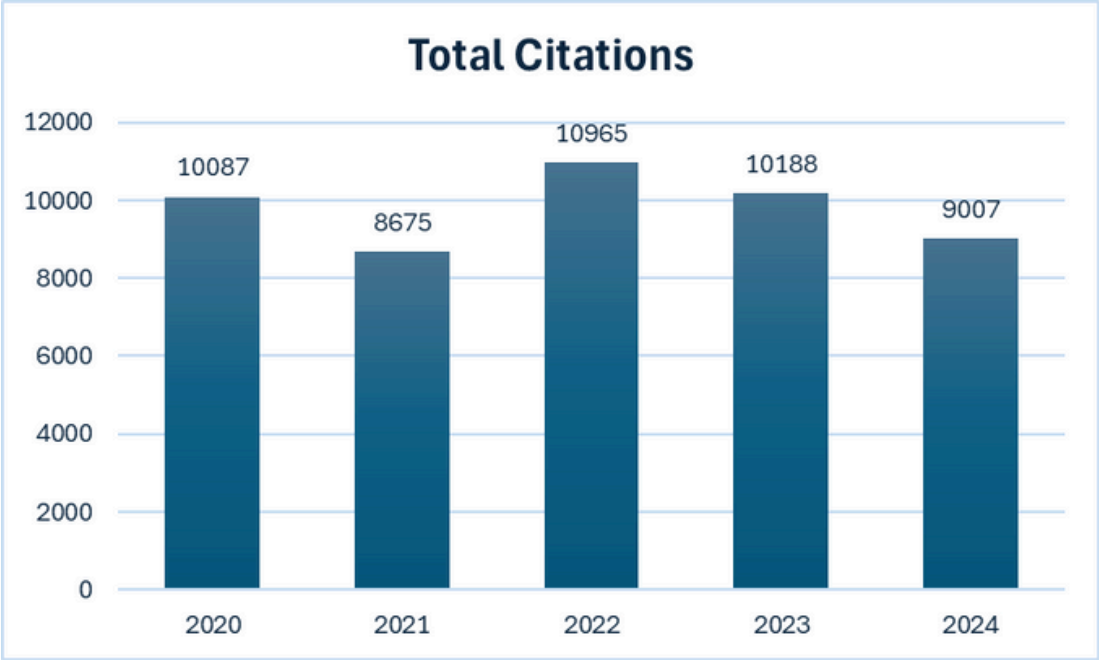

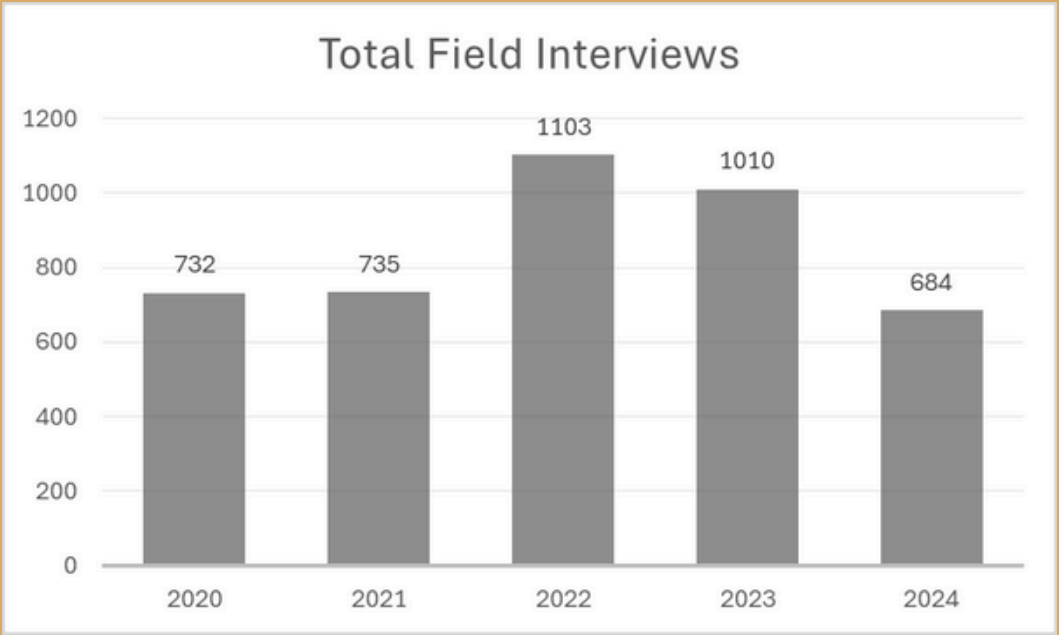
